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







Pre-COVID


- 16 pharmacies providing the service
- Average 1900 transactions a month
- 4082 service users accessed the service
- Heroin was the most prevalent drug being injected














- We remained open!
- Some reduction in working hours
- Social distancing
- Reduced numbers of patients in pharmacies at one time
- Services continued and did not stop




Post-COVID

- 16 pharmacies providing the service
- Average 1200 transactions a month
- 3387 service users accessed the service
- Registrations halved
- The same percentages of drugs being taken

Information on Drug Use







- 16 pharmacies providing the service
- Levels are 70% of pre-COVID
- Pharmacies are very much 'business as usual'
